### RETRIEVING PASTS, IMAGINING FUTURES: CREATIVE FORMS IN AFRICAN WRITING

STIAS, Stellenbosch, 3-7 November 2025

#### **INTRODUCTORY NOTE**

In the 21st Century African writing exists as a powerful creative force on the stage of world literature. This symposium invites writers and academics to consider the unique contribution African writing can make to reformulating the destructive narratives of the past and the present. Rather than thinking of Africa as 'following after' the developed world, we propose writing from Africa as the site for thinking of alternative paths to the future.

The 204<sup>th</sup> Nobel Symposium on *Retrieving Pasts, Imagining Futures: Creative Forms in African Writing* will be the fifth symposium in the *Nobel in Africa* series at STIAS. The invitation-only symposium will gather around 40 of the world's leading scholars and writers, in the field of African writing, with lectures, discussions and an outreach programme.

#### Draft programme (23 May 2025)

The motivating impulse for this symposium is to convene a series of open-ended conversations drawing on the rich collective experience of reading and writing African literature. All participants are invited to engage fully in every session. However, each participant has also been assigned a particular place in the programme. This might be on a panel, in a conversation or part of a reading. Most of the sessions will be closed to the public, unless indicated otherwise.

PANEL: The panels will consist of four presenters. If you are part of a panel, you will be allocated 10 minutes to present on your creative and/or scholarly work in relation to the panel's theme. Following the presentations, we will have a 50-minute discussion period for in-depth conversations.

PUBLIC PANEL: Each presenter is allocated 15 minutes for their intervention, because the Q & A will be shorter, given that this panel is open to the public.

CONVERSATION: A conversation between an author and a critic lasts for one hour: 30 minutes for the conversation and 30 minutes for open discussion. We imagine these conversations deepening and extending some of the themes of the panels.

READINGS: Readings will take place on most days from 15.30-16.30. If you have been assigned to a reading session, you are invited to select and read extracts from your work which relate in some ways to the theme of the day. Feel free to imagine this connection in any way that you would like. Each participant will read for 20 minutes, with the remaining 20 minutes for responses.
