Akachi Ezeigbo – Essayist, literary theorist, novelist, playwright, poet, short story writer and children's author – Akachi Ezeigbo is a Professor of English who taught for three decades at the University of Lagos before moving eastwards to teach at Federal University Ndufu-Alike, Ikwo, in Ebony State.

A multiple award-winning writer and scholar, she has received several national and international awards including a Commonwealth Fellowship (1989/90) and a British Council Fellowship at Cambridge University (1998). She received the first Best Researcher Award in the Arts and Humanities at the University of Lagos. Other prizes and awards include the Cadbury Poetry Prize, WORDOC Short Story Prize, Flora Nwapa Prize, the Nigeria



Prize for Literature, and the African Literature Association's Best Short Story and Fonlon-Nichols Awards.

She has authored and edited over sixty books and published over fifty articles in scholarly journals and edited volumes.

Aminatta Forna is a novelist, memoirist and essayist. Her novels are Happiness, The Hired Man, The Memory of Love and Ancestor Stones. In 2002 she published an investigative memoir of her dissident father and Sierra Leone. The Devil that Danced on the Water. The Window Seat, an essay collection, was published by Grove Press in 2021. She is currently at work on a volume about the nature, ecology and history of the East African Rift Valley.

She is the winner of a Windham Campbell Award from Yale University and the Commonwealth Writers' Prize and has been a finalist for, among others, the Neustadt Prize, the Orange Prize, the Samuel Johnson Prize, the IMPAC Award and Ondaatje Prize. Aminatta is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature and was made Officer of the



British Empire in the Queen's 2017 New Year's Honours list.

Aminatta Forna is Director of the Lannan Center at Georgetown University.

Maaza Mengiste is a novelist, essayist, and photographer. She is the author of the novel, The Shadow King, which was shortlisted for the 2020 Booker Prize. and was a 2020 LA Times Book Prize Fiction finalist. It was named best book of the year by The New York Times, NPR, Elle, Time, and more. Her debut novel. Beneath the Lion's Gaze, was selected by The Guardian as one of the 10 best contemporary African books and named one of the best books of 2010 by Christian Science Monitor, The Boston Globe, and other publications. Her story, "Dust, Ash, Flight," which appeared in Addis Ababa Noir, edited by Maaza, was awarded a 2021 Edgar Award for Best Short Story.

She is the recipient of a Guggenheim Fellowship, an American Academy of Arts and Letters Award in Literature, a DAAD Artists-in-Berlin Fellowship, a Cullman Center for Scholars and Writers Fellowship, the Premio von Rezzori, the Premio il ponte, a Fulbright Fellowship, a National Endowment for the Arts Award, and a Creative Capital Award. Her work can be found in The



New Yorker, The New York Review of Books, Granta, The Guardian, The New York Times, Esquire, Rolling Stone, and BBC, among others.

She has taught at New York University, Princeton University, Northwestern University, and Queens College/CUNY, and is Professor of English at Wesleyan University. She is at work on her third novel.


